

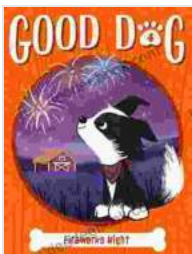
Fireworks Night: Keeping Your Dog Safe and Happy

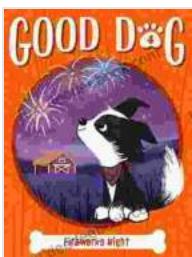

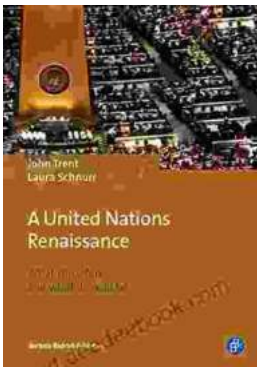
