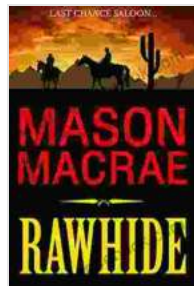


Rawhide Mason Macrae: A Cowboy Legend in His Own Time

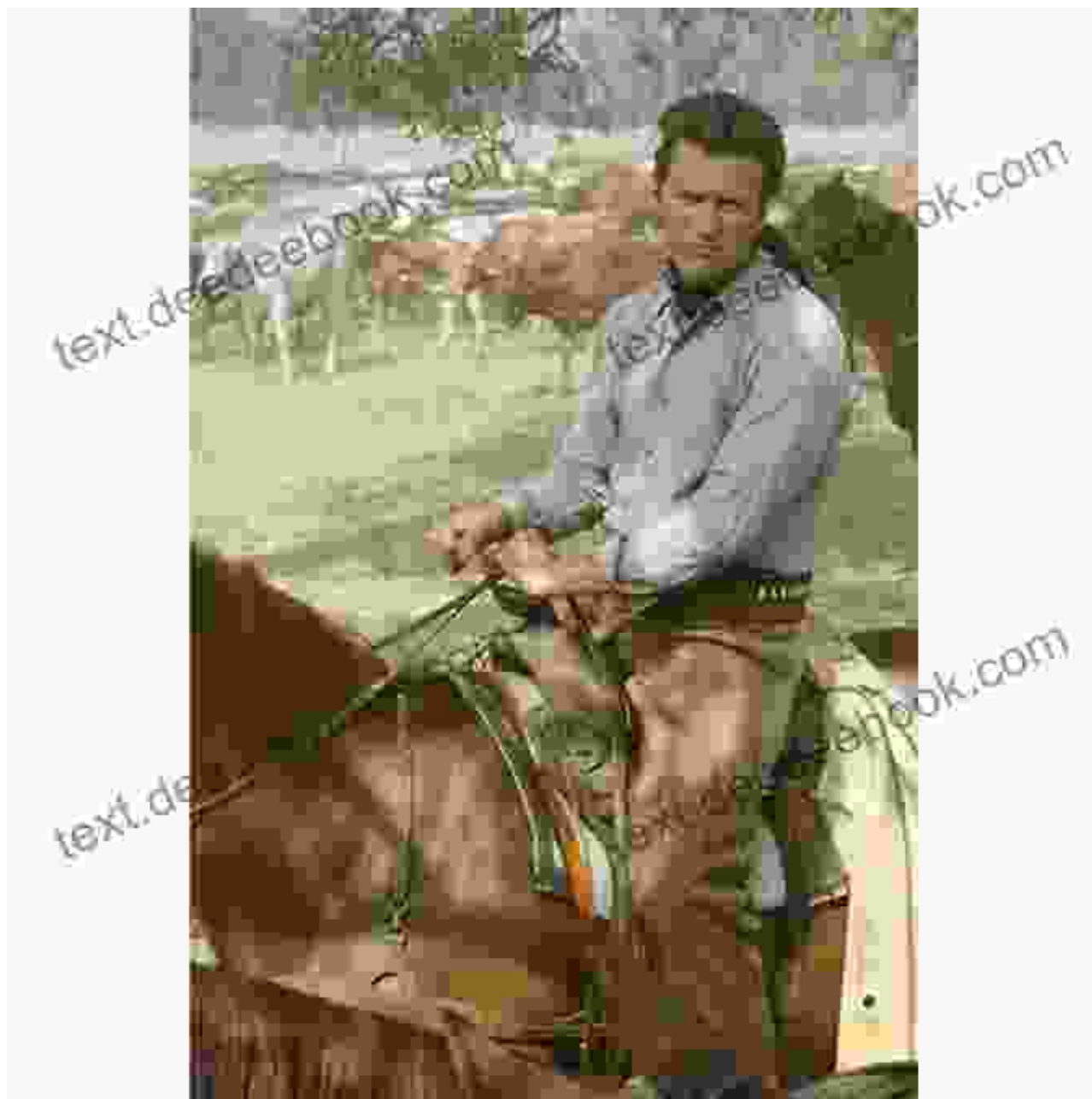

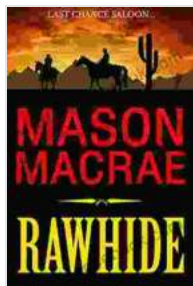

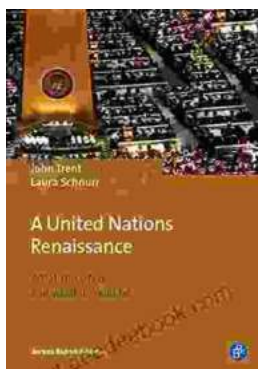
