
The Inside Story of the National Security Council and the Architects of America's Foreign Policy



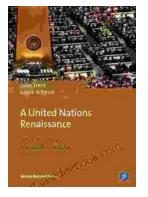
