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
St. Augustine: The Cradle of Florida

Through the Enchanted Forests and Rolling Hills




The trail from St. Augustine to the Cracker Western frontier winds through diverse ecosystems



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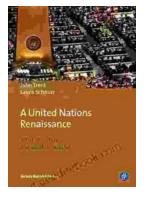
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
