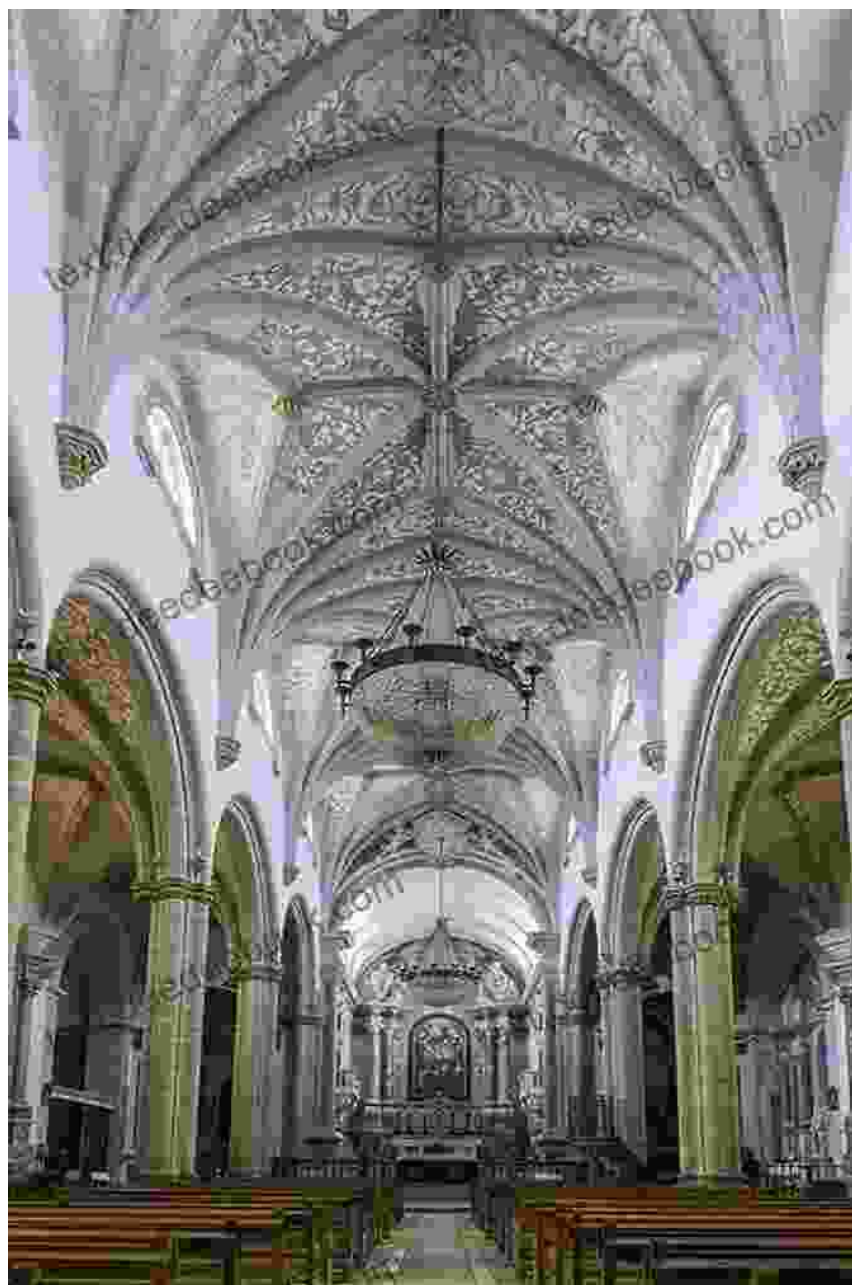
2. Old Cathedral (Sé Velha)

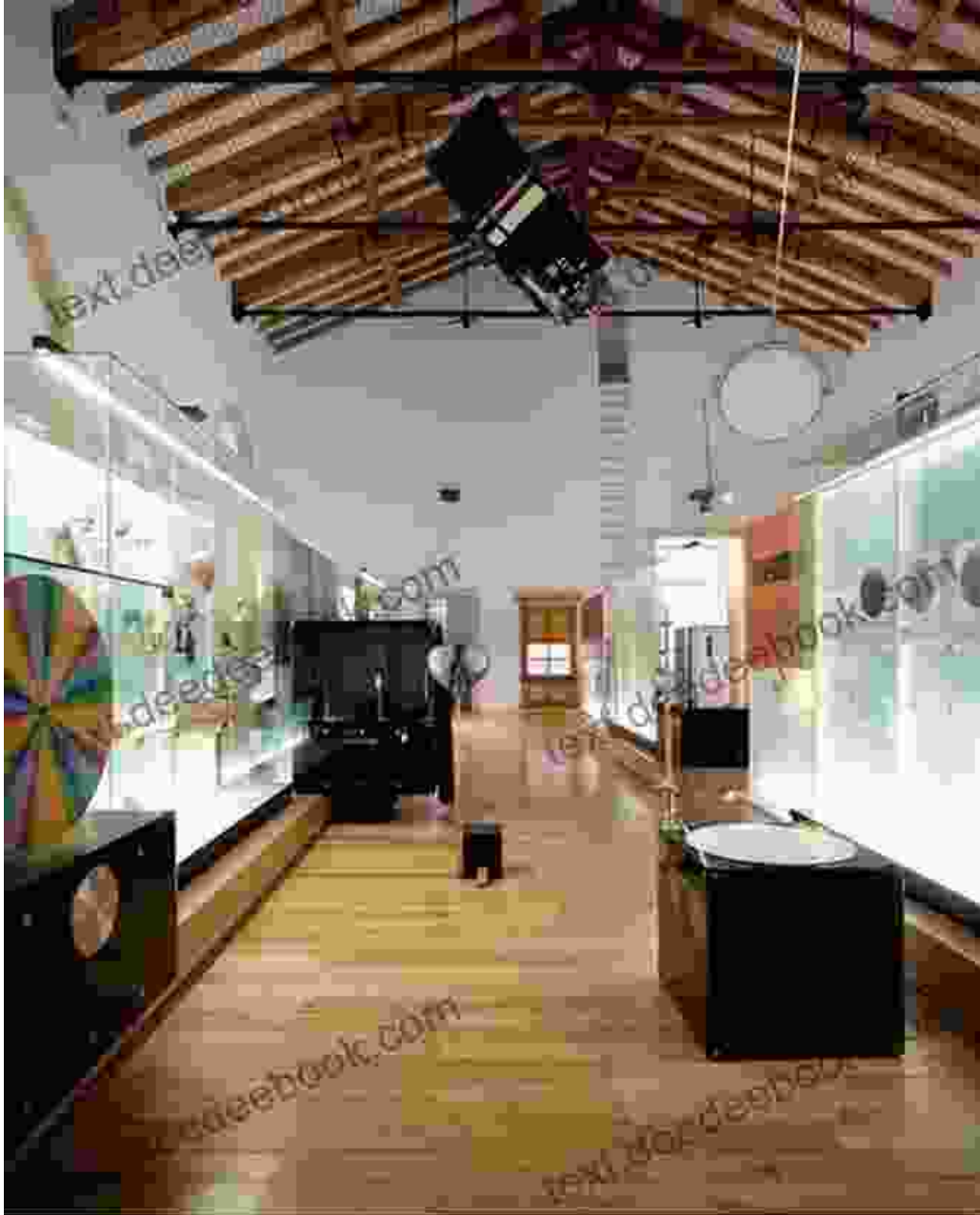

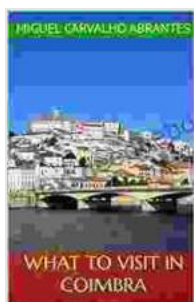

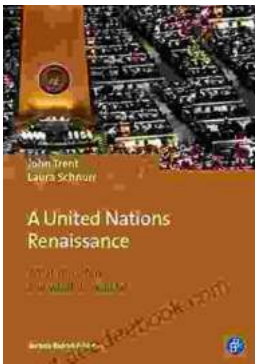
